Now, we might notice that neither the mom nor Julian of Norwich specifies just when or in what way all is going to be OK. If "It's OK" is a statement of faith,

that's because even a loving mom can't, on her own, guarantee OK-ness for her child into the future. If she's promising that, she's relying on God to back her up.



of Israel and Judah as successive rulers either follow or fail to follow in God's way (more don't than do). In my reading this week, Jerusalem is conquered by Babylon and the people are carted off into exile.

Like their Israelite ancestors in Egypt, they'll live long years, even generations, in a foreign land. God asked them to continue to believe and trust in his goodness and faithfulness even in those grievous circumstances, with no rescue on the horizon.

Like their Israelite ancestors wandering in the wilderness, they were tested by the course of their lives and the course of their history. Will they hold fast to their faith and trust in this God who's rescued them before and called them his own people? Will they trust when it's truly faith and not sight that undergirds their trust?

And what about us, when those same questions are asked of us? Will we trust by faith and not by sight?

Challenging times are a good time to hang out in Scripture. It gives perspective, but it's also full of ringing words of promise, like these words that Isaiah spoke to the exiles:

Do not remember the former things, or consider the things of old.

I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it?

I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert (Is. 43:18-19).

Ringing words or promise like these from Revelation that echo Isaiah:

God himself will be with them; he will wipe every tear from their eyes. Death will be no more; mourning and crying and pain will be no more, for the first things have passed away. And the one who was seated on the throne said, "See, I am making all things new" (Rev. 21:3-5).

All shall be well because, no matter what we see right in front of us, God can always, always do a new thing.

Didn't Jesus' first disciples see a glimpse of that when he calmed the wind and waves with the power of his words? This Lord has power over the elements of the earth he created.

Didn't they see it as he healed the sick, taught with a new authority, and forgave sinful pasts, granting new futures?

Didn't they see that God can always do a new thing when their Lord, whose lifeless body they'd seen placed in a tomb, showed up alive again – alive with a new and unending life?

We believers, we're the ones with the knowledge and the confidence to say to an agitated world, "All shall be well, and all shall be well, and all manner of things shall be well."

For the sake of the world, let's stay in touch with the source of our hope. Let's encourage one another to carry a spirit of peace and confidence when we go out into the world.

For the sake of the world, let's stay in Scripture and stay in touch with one another. Let our faith be the foundation for our positive action in the world.

Let's remind ourselves, each other, and the world around us that we know it's going to be OK – all shall be well – because the God of love is in charge of it all.

"Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid." Those are Jesus' words to his disciples then and now. May you live fully in that peace.

Next up is Pastor Dan's installation at Redeemer on Sunday, September 22, at 10:00am.










Karen Katamay to Begin Internship

After many decades of relentless pressure on the foundation of the parsonage and increasing damage from groundwater, we made a major and long-anticipated investment by doing some significant foundation repair. For those of you who like to hear the details: We had specialists install nine steel I-beams from the bottom of the foundation and bolt them to the joists above to halt the inward movement of the south wall of the foundation. We also had them dig and install a new floor tile system and new sump pit and pump, to effectively direct away any seepage that we might get in the future. The workmen did a great job, and we're grateful and relieved to think that we're exercising good stewardship of the wonderful resources that God has entrusted to us.

Meanwhile, since Pastors Carol and Fred had to vacate the parsonage while the foundation work was being done (the sewage pipes had to be cut and slightly relocated), we also took the opportunity to do some work upstairs and replace the well-worn kitchen counters with new granite countertops. New kitchen flooring is scheduled to be installed soon, and Pastor Dan and Rachel will include photos of the redecorated kitchen in an upcoming newsletter.

WHAT'S HAPPENING AT THIRD PLACE

This summer, we decided to make a shift in our ministry efforts around Portage Park. This decision was difficult and included some disappointment, but we also feel a renewed excitement about the possibilities for effective ministry in that area.

Over the past couple years, we tried worship in three different ways in Portage Park (and, to be technical, Old Irving and Jefferson Park). First, we gathered together monthly at Old Irving Brewing. Then, in addition to the monthly gatherings at OIB, we gathered twice a month for Cell Worship at Joe and Angela Duea's home. Finally, we moved our worship from OIB to our ministry center at Third Place Chicago.

There were really good things going on in all three spaces: people supporting and encouraging each other, people being reminded of God's good news for them. But the reality is that we didn't see new people coming into the community directly through worship. So we're looking honestly at where we are and doing a kind of reset.

The folks who have been meeting for worship in Portage Park are being invited to participate in the worshiping community in Park Ridge. We think we have some gifts to bring back to the larger Redeemer community, and we're excited to feel like we're together again. At the same time, we're not giving up at all on making disciples on the Northwest Side. We think we have an opportunity to focus on meeting people where they are with relationships, programs, and events that help people to find better life by living the way Jesus taught. We're hoping to do ministry out of Third Place Chicago that we can do better there than we could from out Park Ridge. We think this is a tremendous opportunity for us to focus on where the energy and possibility are, both in Park Ridge and around Third Place Chicago.

As always, this is both a work in progress (a series of experiments to find what's actually effective) and, at its heart, spiritual work. So I'm asking, once again, for your prayers that God's will would be done more fully through our work together. The possibilities of the gospel are endless, and we're blessed to be a part of this.

Inside Out Network: What's Next?

For over twelve years, Redeemer has had a meaningful and impactful ministry with those who are incarcerated and those leaving prison. Think about it: We've prayed with thousands and thousands of inmates, given away over 7,000 Bibles, created and given away over 50,000 Spiritual Survival Guide for Prison and Beyond, created and given away nearly 10,000 copies of RED Chicago (a ReEntry Directory), written hundreds and hundreds of pen pal letters, and created a revolutionary website to connect returning citizens with service providers (the Inside Out Network). It's been a constantly evolving ministry that's been dependent on God's timing, available resources, our leadership capacity, and new opportunities and challenges that God has sent our way.

True to form, things are about change again. Since my physical presence and leadership in this particular ministry has been a constant during these years, our move to Arizona at the end of October will have an unavoidable impact on the shape of Redeemer's ministry. As I contemplate where God may be directing things next, two things come to mind.

First, I'm going to try to make a major push to scale up the Inside Out Network website as a tool to help people around the country network and connect more effectively. I hope to be able to focus my time, energy, and imagination on expanding the network in Arizona, but also in other areas where people are ready for change. For example, I'm currently working with networks in Milwaukee, Greenville in South Carolina, and Chester County in Pennsylvania (suburban Philadelphia), as well as with new contacts right here in Chicago.

As these efforts ramp up, it seems that the wisest course is to shift this work away from being a ministry under the Redeemer umbrella and make it its own independent non-profit organization, what's called a 501(c)3. I plan to do that in the first half 2020.

At the same time, our prison and reentry ministry has never been a one-man show. So many of you have been involved over the years as financial supporters, in -prison volunteers, letter-writers, phone callers, data entry helpers, small group facilitators, and more! Because it's coming from your own passion for serving in this way, much of this wonderful ministry can and should continue in my absence.

Aneel Trivedi will continue to help lead and coordinate certain aspects of our work. He is still patiently pursuing clearance from the Department of Corrections to be classified as a "volunteer chaplain," which would allow him authorized access to Stateville Prison and to bring along volunteers. Going forward, Aneel will be Redeemer's go-to person to help you find your spot as a Stateville volunteer, pen pal, data entry helper, and so on. It's his desire to work collaboratively, so connect with him by talking to him at church or by sending him an email at aneel@insideoutnetwork.net.

I want to take this opportunity to thank so many of you for opening your hearts over these years to those in prison and those struggling with the challenge of reentering society. You've courageously stepped onto unknown terrain again and again, and our Lord has stretched and blessed and grown your faith and love. *Keep it going!*

Website and Postcards to Get the Word Out

Over the next few months we will be rolling out a redesigned website and sending out a postcard mailing for both the church and our community center, Third Place Chicago.

The last time we completely redesigned the website was in 2012 when we were in the early stages of planting the North avenue location. While we've done a good job keeping the site current, it can be difficult to maintain (photos quickly become dated, individuals step into and out of different leadership roles, biographies change, etc.). Additionally, due to our weekly emails and encouraged use of church community builder, our website is no longer the spot where members and regular attenders gather information about what's happening in the community.

Because of all this, we've decided to significantly pare back the amount of content on our site. Similar to our Third Place Chicago website, our new church website will load faster and put the most important information right in front of the eyes of first-time visitors.

As we have done in the past, we'll send out over 10,000 postcards to the area around us. The specific content will be slightly different at the two locations, but both will focus on our offering of coaching for personal growth. We've already seen individuals within our own community experience great growth through this focus on one-on-one coaching, and we believe that it's something that will resonate with people looking to make some kind of change in their life.

I'm excited to see who God will add to the community in the weeks and months ahead.

Our focus on spiritual growth coaching requires plenty of coaches. One evening in August, coaches gathered for a training workshop led by Pastor Fred.




MINI VBS SET FOR SEPTEMBER 7

Youth Group Plans in Place

Greetings! We're looking forward to a fun year with the youth (6th through 12th grade) at Redeemer. Youth activities will have two areas of focus: Sunday morning learning hour (10am at Redeemer) and large group multi-church activities.

Sunday mornings

Based on feedback from the youth last year, we'll be focused on content that allows the youth to explore their own faith and ask questions about the Bible, the Apostles' Creed, Jesus, and how faith intersects with topics that are relevant to us today. We'll be using a curriculum from Sparkhouse called "re:Form" as a foundation for these discussions. This curriculum on Sunday mornings can also take the form of confirmation preparation for youth or families who are interested. Large Group Multi-Church activities

Building on the success of these events last year, we plan to continue bringing the youth together with three other local Lutheran churches: Edison Park, Messiah, and St. Luke's. Events rotate through each of the four churches and give the youth a chance to connect and build relationships with a larger group. The first event of the fall will take place on Sunday, September 8, from 6:30 to 8:00 pm at Messiah Lutheran.
